The following answers are in their own words and have not been edited.

Janice Bishop:

1. Nine years.
2. I think I have valuable talents and I want to contribute positively to the community I live in.
3. a) To encourage more younger citizens to be involved in the life of the community.
b) To foster positive working relationships with the Mennonite families.
c) Replace the infrastructure in a timely and financially prudent manner.

Joe Cameron:

1. I have lived in town for 6 years, beside town for another 5 years and within 20 miles of town all my life.
2. Because I was unhappy with some previous decisions made in Lougheed. We had to get the debt load under control.
3. To continue to be fiscally responsible. Downtown sidewalk replacement. Upgrade our infrastructure as needed and affordable. Good snow removal in winter and drivable streets in winter and summer.

Sonny Losness:

1. Since 1967.
2. Because I was interested in how the Village Government operated. Also I hoped to be able to make things better in the village and help make new improvements to better the village.
3. To help improve our aging infrastructure and encourage more growth in the community.

Dave Twerdochlib:

1. Two Years.
2. After careful thought and upon the request of many requests of many residents for change, I put in my nomination.
3. As a Councillor, I will try to improve the operations of council, to uphold the best interest of the Village of Loughheed and the Taxpayers by
 - a) Attracting more business and keeping existing businesses in our Village.

 - e) Encourage residents to attend more open Form Council Meetings , so their opinions can be heard.

I believe rate payers should have access to all information that isn't protected by the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy legislation. Council's responsibility is not only to establish current priorities but also to establish a vision for the future that is in the best interest for members of the community. Council will encounter many challenges over the next four years as government grants are reduced and the aging infrastructure in the village must be repaired or replaced.
